FEDERATION OF CHAMBERS IS MOVING FORWARD

The Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry of Sri Lanka has rapidly moved forward during the last two years, said the President of the Federation Ajith Wathuhewa, in an interview he gave recently. He said that he had been a member of the Federation Council since 1996 when he was first

appointed to it

from the Badulla Chamber in the Uva Province. "I was a senior council member who had served several presidents of the Federation, Taking into account my experience as an active council member continuously for several years, I was appointed as a director of the Federation in 2007. Then I was made the Vice President, and later Senior Vice President. I was elected President in January 2014."

Mr. Wathuhewa started his education in Dharmadutha College in Badulla and later joined Carey

Collage in Colombo, He finished his secondary education at Badulla Central College. After GCE (AL) he joined Moratuwa University and completed his NDT. From that point onwards he has developed businesses using his entrepreneurial talent. He started off with a tyre rebuilding business in Badulla. Today he is into advertising, media, entertainment, tourism, and foreign employment recruitment with an office in Oman.

I took over as president at a very challenging time for the Federation. The main problem was funding. We were short of funds to meet even the basic expenses of the organization. I selected a new Secretary General and together we made a plan. I had a "50/50" vision for the Federation to make it a viable and effective entity. Fifty percent of Federation work should be service to its members but the other fifty percent should be business so that the Federation becomes financially stable. To make this a reality I spoke with the donor community, mainly the embassies in Colombo, to solicit their support. I assured them that the Federation would be fully transparent and accountable in its work and serve the regional chambers that are members.

The service component of the Federation's' work has two major dimensions. One is lobbying with government regarding business issues. The second is to open up contacts with the SAARC countries and the rest of the world. We organized two chamber leaders' summits to address issues of the members of the regional chambers. We are now working to resolve these issues. In the run up to the budget of the new government we presented a proposal to the government based on the ideas that the two meetings generated. We also conducted workshops on how Sri Lankan business, especially tourism and agriculture, should respond to climate change. We have conducted workshops on energy and

on a variety of other topics to upgrade business knowledge. The Federation's conference on energy attracted delegates both from local chambers as well as from abroad.

The Federation recognizes that Sri Lanka's future economic growth will largely depend on exports. Exploring opportunities to grow exports and informing the Regional Chambers is a priority. We organized a twoday international conference on tourism that attracted delegates from SAARC countries.

I am also pleased to note that the Federation in Sri Lanka as well as more broadly in our fraternal Federations and Chambers in the SAARC countries activity has shifted from mere lobbying for policy to business development This in my view is a very progressive step.

The Federation has joined the SAARC business visa program that facilitates travel in SAARC countries. We have already made available more than 300 such visas to our business leaders.

During the past eighteen months the Federation has sent more than 250 delegates to SAARC countries mainly to participate in trade exhibitions and showcase our products. We have made a special effort to reach out to our regional chambers to participate in these

Pakistan embassy to set up an Entrepreneur Development Center in Sri Lanka with the Federation.

I believe that women entrepreneurs deserve a better deal. I secured a seat for a representative of women's chambers to sit on the Federation Board. Having found that there are good prospects for Anthurium export the Federation has developed a cluster for the industry that now has about 3,000 members, mostly women.

> The latest und perhaps one of the most innovative projects we have conceived is to establish a Federation Campus for higher education. This also will be a source of funds for the Federation.

> I have also introduced a financial incentive scheme for Federation employees to encourage them to improve their productivity. At the same time I have also cut cost of operations to save money.

The Federation will hold its annual Entrepreneur of the Year awards ceremony this year on the 30th of December.

Mrs. Wathuhewa is a homemaker. The couple has one daughter. Mr. Wathuhewa tries to keep a balance between work and family life. "I get up at 7 a.m. and go to bed very late in the night. I feel free to work when all are sleeping." he said. I am a good time manager and I am very punctual. I also keep the weekends for my family. When I go home I make it a point to talk to my daughter about her studies."

FCCISL Moves Towards a Better Tomorrow....

In the context of the government's plan for achieving an economic growth of 6-7 percent during the coming years, FCCISL will perform the important role of a catalyst in building public-private partnerships in trade investment and capacity building with a special focus on climate change and disaster risk management.



FCCISL has already initiated action to promote regional trade using FTA's with India and Pakistan while analyzing the effect of Non-tariff Measures and Non-tariff Barriers on intra SAARC trade.

FCCISL has also started the Indo Ceylon Economic Dialogue (ICE dialogue) this year to initiate an open dialogue on NTM's and NTB's between business communities operating in Sri Lanka, thus providing a platform for businessmen and professionals engaged in trade between the two countries to express their views on existing NTM's and NTB.

In 2016, FCCISL will organize a series of meetings with the Indian business community in India. The first such meeting will be held in the capital of Kerala – Kochin in the first quarter of 2016.

FCCISL will continue to engage in promoting investments to Sri Lanka. It will hold the SAARC investment forum in September 2016 in Colombo on promoting Tourism, Aviation and Maritime in South Asia.

In the future FCCISL will actively engage in promoting Sri Lanks as a conference destination and is already in touch with several international agencies to conduct regional conferences on climate change, disaster risk reduction and road connectivity in the region.

Another land mark event for FCCISL in 2016 is signing an agreement with UNDP -Colombo for them to join Sri Lanka's comprehensive disaster recovery plan through the regional chamber network. FCCISL will promote private sector involvement in this plan.

FCCISL has sent over 250 delegates to various trade fairs and exhibitions in the Asia Pacific Region. It will continue with this programme.

Being one of the 28 member organizations in the SAARC trade promotion network in Kathmandu-Nepal, FCCISL will continue to work with the TPN in year 2016 as well.

In the year 2015 FCCISL proposed the country plan to UNESACP – BANGKOK to establish a chamber of commerce and industry under the Asia Pacific Trade Agreement. It is expected to increase its stake in the Asia Pacific Region in the future.

With regard to organizational development, FCCISL will introduce a more effective corporate governance system and further strengthen its chamber network. FCCISL will also develop a capacity development plan for its chamber network in the future.

FCCISL is the apex body of the chamber movement in Sri Lanka, It is also the only Sri Lankan member of the SAARC Chamber of Commerce and Industry in Islamabad – Pakistan, As such it is expected to occupy the prestigious Senior Vice President position of the SAARC—CCI in Pakistan in the near future.

Exposure to International Markets

The Federation organized several international trade delegations to visit Sri Lanka and meet our entrepreneurs. We also organized Sri Lankan trade delegations to visit international markets in several countries. Facilitating our entrepreneurs to obtain SAARC visa enabling them to visit all SAARC countries is another service provided.

Tourism Potential in Ella

Around 2001 when I visited Ella it was a sleepy village in the Badulla District best known as a convenient way stop for a few travellers on the way to Kataragama and beyond. Ella is about 14km northeast of Bandarawela that has been better known as a holiday town.

When I visited Ella earlier this month after a lapse of almost fourteen years I found an Ella that has been trunsformed into a bustling tourist town, a kind of mini Hikkaduwa. It is a classic market-driven development that, on balance, appears to have been good for almost all concerned. The local business community as well as some who have moved in from outside have invested in restaurants, guesthouses, spas, beauty parlors and other tourism related businesses. Tourism is providing jobs to many. The ruilway is doing well transporting tourists. The Ella Pradesheeya Sabha should be earning more tax revenue. The country is earning foreign exchange. The foreign tourists, mostly in the younger age group who are interested in mountaineering, trekking, rock climbing and other outdoor pursuits, have found Ella an attractive destination. It is by and large a win-win situation for all concerned.

Scope for Improvement

The purpose of writing this article is to point out some development work that official agencies ranging from the Central Government, (Sri Lanka Tourism Development Authority, Ceylon Government Railway (CGR), Road Development Authority et al), Uva Provincial Council, and Ella Pradesheeya Sabha could do in cooperation with the local business community, civil society and others to further boost the Ella tourist industry. It should be a well-coordinated effort. The plan of action should be based on hard data. Some information already exists. For example, the Railway has data on passengers. The Uva PC and the Pradesheeya Sabha will have a data on businesses and taxes. I found in a few seconds from the Internet that "Booking.com" has listed 129 places in Ella where visitors could stay. Assuming an average capacity of five double rooms per facility Ella is currently able to accommodate about 1,000 visitors per night. Data gaps for a sound development plan could be filled with the assistance of Uva University that can be provided some resources to conduct a survey of tourism, environment and other tourism/development issues in Ella.

Devolution is more meaningful to local communities when they are involved in local development. Ella Tourism development can be institutionalized with a body that could be established with the participation of all the main stakeholders including the local trade chamber known as the Ella Tourism and Trade Development Association (ETTDA).

Water Supply

A very positive recent development is the construction of a major water supply facility for Ella, Haliela and Badulla. Exim Bank of USA has given a twelve-year loan of \$64.9m (Rs 8.5 billion) for the facility. A massive storage tank is under construction close to the Ella town to supply water to the area.

Priority Needs

As a casual observer I noticed a few things that official agencies could do to improve Ella as a tourist destination. The main road (A23) that runs through the town is under repair/rehabilitation. The RDA should finish the job as soon as possible. The byroads and lanes in the town need repair. The approach road to the railway station must be widered and the vehicle park at the station should be improved. The storm water drainage and the sewerage system in the town also need attention. Adequate street lighting on the main road and byroads are a must, especially to make the visitors feel safer. The main passenger trains that serve Ella are the Colombo/Kandy-Badulla trains. The local passenger trains are a few poorly maintained carriages attached to freight trains. One such train I took from Iddalgashinna to Ella that runs along a breath-taking scenic 34km section of the rail line was late by almost two hours and was also overcrowded with about half locals and half tourists. The CGR should consider the viability of having a modern railcar running on a regular timetable to serve both locals and visitors.

Solid Waste Disposal

One of the most pressing issue that must be addressed is solid waste disposal. There is a so called garbage "recycling" center maintained by the Ella PS less than half of a km from the town. The facility poses a serious public health and environmental hazard, and threatens to undermine the tourist industry. First, it lacks the capacity to deal with the increasing volume of garbage that the town produces. Second, Ella residents say that there are days when the smell that emanates from the facility becomes unbearable in the whole area and the smoke that rises from burning garbage pollutes the entire town. The local trade chamber ETTDA and the people of Ella have been agitating since 2010 to persuade the Ella PS and higher authorities to relocate the garbage disposal facility but to no avail.

Development Model

The new government talks a lot about development. Ella offers a practical opportunity to do development with a modest amount of financial resources combined with creativity and political will. It can serve as a useful model for similar development efforts elsewhere.
